The seminar will feature the following distinguished line-up of presenters who will set the stage for the engagement of delegates in debate and reflection on the training and development of teachers in relation to the 2014 Primary National Curriculum:

- **Professor Michael Apple:** *John Bascom Professor of Curriculum and Instruction and Educational Policy Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Among numerous academic and professional awards, his book **Ideology and Curriculum** was named as one of the most important books in education in the 20th Century. He continues to research and publish “on the limits and possibilities of critical educational policy and practice in a time of conservative restoration” delivering invited keynotes not only in the Anglophone world (Canada, UK and US) but also in Argentina, Brazil, China, India, Macedonia and Spain as well. Recent books include: **Can education change society?; Education and power; and Global crises, social justice, and education.***
- **Professor Gary Beauchamp:** *Director of Research for the School of Education and Professor of Education at Cardiff Metropolitan University and lead author of the background paper **Research and Teacher Education: The BERA-RSA Inquiry - Policy and Practice within the United Kingdom** published in December 2013. He is a prolific researcher and has published extensively in the area of ICT in education, particularly the use of interactive technologies in learning and teaching.*
- **Professor Ann Lieberman:** *Senior Scholar and Interim Executive Director of the Stanford Center for Opportunity Policy in Education (SCOPE), an affiliate of Stanford University. She is an emeritus professor from Teachers College, Columbia University and was a Senior Scholar at the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching for 10 years. She is widely known for her work in the areas of teacher leadership and development, collaborative research, networks and school–university partnerships, and the problems and prospects for understanding educational change. She is an internationally sought-after speaker having recently delivered invited keynotes in China (Shanghai and Beijing) and Finland.*
